They are part of the reason why I became a science teacher later in life. <b>Sr. Albertus Marie</b>, now <b>Sr. Joan Delaney</b> taught us to think and question, <b>Sr. Miriam Francis</b> and <b>Sr. Victoria Marie (now Marie Ann)</b> taught us to love music and to sing with a passion. (We became winners at the yearly Music Festival in Hong Kong !) <b>Sr. Eucharista</b> who was our Spiritual Director of the legion of Mary, Our Lady of China presidium, convinced us that we are loved. That experience in the Legion of Mary afford me the opportunity to get to know some of the least of our brothers and sisters who live in Model Village , in Kowloon Tong.</p> <p>Helen Lai, Eleanor Wong, Angela Djao, Kathleen Tam, Annette Chan, Ellis Chung, Nancy Chung (both my sisters) all set wonderful examples of being true Maryknollers. Other classmates have also had a hand to shape the person that I am today.</p> <p>In more recent years, I have had the good fortune of connecting with members of the graduating Class of 1971 who seem to have adopted me as their own. Their generosity, enthusiasm and kindness have overwhelmed me. 15	<p>The 7 years in Maryknoll gave me the good foundation to go on to college in USA and to complete my Ph.D in biochemistry. The advanced degree enabled me to become a Biology Professor at the University of Hawaii at Manoa in Honolulu, Hawaii. During the last 9 years at the university before my retirement as a Professor Emeritus, I was the director of the Biology Program where I supervised over 500 biology majors, helping them to obtain a good education thus achieving their career goals.</p> <p>Without the education in Maryknoll, I would not have had the success that I enjoyed in my career.</p>
59	<p>As I said before, I really appreciate the religious and academic education I received from my Sister and teachers in Maryknoll and in St. Rose of Lima (where I completed my primary school). I do believe my Catholic belief plays an important part in my growing up. 48	<p>I grew up in MARYKNOLL. I learned English, writing, first printing and then Cursive Writing, Arithmetic, Algebra and Trigonometry among other skills needed to survive in society. I remember the kindergarten room behind “Amah’s Shelter” to the auditorium in the section where we had our graduation ceremony. Maryknoll Convent School was my second home, it was more my real home because of the learning that took place within its walls. I spent a lot time there while I was at school. After class, I joined extracurricular activities such as the Legion of Mary, life guarding at the pool, and doing sports like netball. I think I’m addicted to exercise now because of the sports I took at Maryknoll. I was one of those mediocre students who were neither too outstanding nor studious, but who always managed to pull through without any awareness of how it was done. My classmates and I had great fun in school. We played a few tricks on the teachers (never on the Sisters), and hopefully we didn’t bruise anybody’s ego.</p> <p>I think my greatest gifts from Maryknoll are my faith and the sense of dedication as I grew older, I realized that this group of women came to Hong Kong with little other than an enormous amount of faith in God and their dedication to educate us. They gave us the best years of their lives and they continue to give. On further reflection, I saw that it can only be by the Grace of God and a deep sense of faith in HIM that made it all happen. I hope that this is what moved me to teach in China.</p>
123	I am very thankful to be a Maryknoller. At school, I was taught to be honest, sincere, hard-working, polite, thoughtful and compassionate to those less fortunate; in short, to be a good person. Of course my parents also believed in those same virtues and saw that they’re ingrained in me. These teachings stood me in good stead throughout my dealing with friends, colleagues and clients.

It brings back memories of agony over exam times, especially when I was a P6 student and the HK Government exams had to be re-taken as the test questions were “leaked”. Donated scholarship for liberal studies. Happy to give career talks and mentor students as a group re. government or NGO service.</p>

A good command of the English Language (crucial for someone who settled down and raised a daughter in English speaking Canada).</li> <li>2. The religious exposure enables a great appreciation of Christianity, European culture, art and music, architecture, literature, history etc.</li> <li>3. <b>Miss Yu</b> teaching/drilling in history, Chinese, European and otherwise, forms a great backdrop for my own understanding of the world, past and present. My constant thanks and fond remembrance, especially when traveling in England an Europe.</li> <li>4. Great net work of fellow Maryknollers that share similar values, thinking as we were cut from the same cookie cutter so to speak. A common bond wherever, whenever we are and meet.</li> <li>5. Multiculturalism – early exposure to people from different countries and ethnicity, e.g. nuns, students. Personally I found the understanding of the Bible (Old Testament particularly) enables myself in working with people of the Jewish faith and a greater awareness of the diversity and importance of various religious groups. I was never baptized, but do not consider myself an atheist either....</li> <li>6. Etiquette – when viewing the present young generation mode of operation ( realized how ingrained the value of consideration and manners had been indoctrinated to us at Maryknoll and become so much part of our upbringing.</li> <li>7. Independence – as missionaries, the nuns set an example for a different life choice for us Chinese girls besides the conventional choice of marriage and family. We were shown early on that a life style / choice required sacrifice and hard work. But always possible, of a person’s own choosing and responsibilities to bear the consequences</li> <li>8. A privilege to have an inside look and better understanding of a religious / missionary community.</li> </ol>

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13	<p>Like any influences in one’s life journey, the formative years I spent at school, i.e. 12 years at MCS, have lasting effects on my own personal development. There are good ones and bad ones. Some definitely long need discarding. With the passage of the years, it seems the majority of the good and positive ones remain (or I choose to maintain). It is when raising the second generation (in my case, a daughter) that a lot of the unspoken values and beliefs, ethics, life principles surfaced. If reflected upon, the impact of the 12 years of Maryknoll experience cannot ever be erased. I am always surprised by the fact that the school name still means a lot to people from Hong Kong of my own “vintage”, mostly in a positive way, of course.</p> <p>I have no great achievement to brag of , no great influence on anyone’s life, or have personally received any accolades in my line of work, I being a very ordinary person living a simple and very uneventful, ordinary life in quiet Canada. However I am content enough to say that I have raised a second generation applying much that I had learnt at school and the end result is one that of a decent human being, nothing more and nothing less.</p> <p>May I take this opportunity to express my thanks and appreciation for the teachers, educators, and administrators, whose faces have long faded and names forgotten; who had run the school and convent over the years, and created a nurturing environment that had become so much part of my own upbringing and guiding light. Their teachings and principles had helped me form my own personal and professional standards in the past, and am sure in years to come. For this, I am eternally grateful.</p> <p>I have been always proud to say I am a Maryknoller, even after leaving school for 40 years.</p>
23	<p>My musical talent stemmed from when I was 6 years old, but was fostered through the singing lessons and morning assemblies at Maryknoll. I had many occasions of piano competitions when I was studying at Baptist College and I usually either come first or second. I was conductor for the Hong Kong Baptist College and won 3 years in a row the championship for mixed 4-part choir, and therefore, got the perpetual cup of Choir singing from all Hong Kong universities. I was organist for St Teresa’s Church Choir since I was in F.2, and am still organist at our local church in Sydney. I also have been teaching the young ones to play the organ for the church, without charge.</p> <p>I go to daily mass and recently put on the veil again – just like when we had school mass and that brought back many memories.</p> <p>I was a girl guide before with <b>Miss Wong</b>. I am still using skills learnt then, knots tied then, and this survey is also forwarded by her. I still keep 3 friends that I loved going out with since high school. We communicate quite frequently over the internet.</p>

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47	<p>I remember <b>Sister Virginia</b> telling me that I must “act like a lady at all times” ...She’s a Southern Belle! I do try to behave like one ... at least most of the times!!</p> <p>I would love to offer my service @ MCS; however, my work schedule and my business travel precludes me from doing so may be later after I retire!</p>
75	<p>I always give credit to MCS, especially the Sisters, for instilling in me at an early age a strong commitment to social justice and empathy for others. Just as an anecdote; when I was in Primary 5, <b>Sister Matthew</b> was our home room teacher. One morning, in the middle of a lesson, we heard an ambulance speeding by with siren in full blast. Sr. Matthew stopped what she was doing, not because of the noise, but to invite us to say a Hail Mary for the person who was in need of emergency medical care. To this day, I still say a prayer whenever I hear an ambulance with sirens on.</p> <p>As a Women’s Studies professor, I am actively engaged in the work of “using education to promote social justice.”</p> <p>I would welcome the opportunity to mentor Maryknoll students, especially those who find their way to New York state. I try to visit Hong Kong every summer, and would love to give talks to or meet with Maryknollers–current as well as former students.</p>
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180	<p>Maryknoll gave me the foundation I needed with the skills I was taught to succeed in everything I do. The Sisters taught me discipline and provided me with an above-average education which opened many doors to many opportunities that I otherwise would not have. My education gave me the edge needed to excel in everything I do and be successful at it. I am very grateful to the Maryknoll Sisters and Teachers who taught me everything I needed to know at the start of my working life.</p> <p>I was the first of 5 women to work at Pacific Bell Telephone in a traditionally male job titled Transmission Man. The title confirms what a closed work environment I was in. I had to apply myself to learn Basic Electricity and how to work with tools and electrical wiring and lift/carry heavy Central Office wire wheels weighing 50 lbs. each. I was expected to do everything a man did for top dollar. I made a lot of money working with mostly male technicians and became a Union Member. The men did not give me any slack in doing my job, and I had a steep learning curve.</p> <p>I could be available to give career talks at MCS or mentoring a Form 6 student, but I am in the US and I wonder how practical that would be unless I do it by email.</p> <p>I could go down the list of my Class of 1967 and tell you we have many Maryknollers who have special accomplishments. What might be helpful is to have a bulletin board where you could list the MCS students who might be interested in connecting with a mentor with specific interests and skills.</p>

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198	<p>I was admitted into Form 1 after the public primary 6 examination for admission into secondary schools in Hong Kong. As I studied in a Chinese school prior to Maryknoll, I was a real challenge to Sisters, teachers (who gave me special and extra attention) and classmates who gave me one-on-one private tuition for free + old book. Tuition fees were also waived for me as I was dependent on a single mother who had to scrub for every penny. <b>Sister Mary Gerald (Elizabeth Britz)</b> also sourced old uniforms for me, admission to Franciscan Hostel for girls and even helped mend fences when my mother and I got into arguments and neither of us would back down.</p> <p>Because of Maryknoll’s unlimited support physically and spiritually, I excelled in my career due to good English, diligence, the courage to speak up and speak out especially for the under-privileged people and a “never give up” attitude.</p> <p>Socially, Maryknoll has helped me to shed my shyness. I can get into groups easily and usually invited to take up responsible roles. Although the standard of my English is probably lowest amongst my classmates, it was sufficient for me to excel in the corporate world – I’ve always been complimented as having good English standard.
